New Point Fortin Hospital On Its Way

n Thursday 21st May, 2015 Dr. The Honourable Fuad Khan, Minister of Health was joined by Dr. Honourable Roodal Moonilal, Minister of Housing and Urban Development; and Dr. Lackram Bodoe, Chairman of the South-West Regional Health Authority to turn the sod for the commencement of construction of the new Point Fortin Hospital. The new hospital is scheduled to be completed by January 2018.

Delivering the feature address at the ceremony, Minister Khan said, "The 170, 000 square feet facility will provide 100 beds comprising 24 Medicine beds, 26 general surgery beds, 10 gynaecology beds, 15 obstetrics beds, 6 psychiatry beds, 10 paediatric/adolescent beds, 5 burns beds and 4 high dependence beds." The facility will also house 5 operating theatres, and provide laboratory, radiology, pharmacy and physiotherapy services.

Dr. Bodoe said, "The major benefit of this new hospital will be that very few, if any, patients will now have to be transferred to the SFGH and those very sick patients will now be treated closer to their homes and loved ones."

he master plans for the redevelopment of three of this nation's major hospitals: the Eric Williams Medical Sciences Complex, Port of Spain General and San Fernando General Hospitals, were revealed on Tuesday 26th May, 2015 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel. These hospitals were constructed between 60 to 100 years ago and over time population growth and demands for healthcare made it necessary to develop this structured approach towards meeting the needs of the current and future generations.

Under this redevelopment the San Fernando General Hospital will include expansions in the following areas:

- Bed capacity from 711 to 839 beds
- Imaging Rooms from 11 to 20 rooms
- Operating Rooms from 6 to 8 rooms

The South-West Regional Health Authority welcomes this upgrade of its main hospital as teams of dedicated health workers continue to provide comprehensive, quality healthcare in a safe and healthy environment.

An initial team of 10 Chinese medical specialists arrived on August 7, 2014 after Prime Minister, Honourable Kamla Persad-Bissessar, made an official visit to the People's Republic of China. On January 31st 2015, a new batch of 10 Chinese Healthcare professions joined the SWRHA Team. Under a Memorandum of Understanding, Trinidad and Tobago will have the services of the nine consultants and one nurse for a period of two years, with a new team rotating every six months.

INGUINAL HERNIA WORKSHOP

r. Sunildath Jugool, Registrar (Ag.) at the Department of Surgery, partnered with Professor Vijay Naraynsingh of the Department of Surgical Clinical Sciences at the University of the West Indies, St. Augustine Campus to coordinate an Inguinal Hernia Workshop at the San Fernando General Hospital on Wednesday 25th February, 2015.

Guest surgeon, Dr. Brian Stephenson from the Department of Surgery at the Royal Gwent Hospital Newport, Wales, a pioneer in inguinal hernia repair, demonstrated local anaesthetic repair of inguinal hernias and delivered three lectures on the procedure from Monday 23rd to Wednesday 25th February, 2015 at the Port of Spain General Hospital, the Eric Williams Medical Sciences Complex and the San Fernando General Hospital (SFGH).

Inguinal hernia occurs when a small portion of the bowel bulges out through the inguinal canal- a passage or opening through the muscles of the abdominal wall- into the groin. Local anaesthetic repair of inquinal hernias involves the surgical removal of inquinal hernias using local anaesthetic.



With the aid of SWRHA's Information Communication Technology (ICT) Department, the surgery demonstrating open inquinal hernia local anaesthetic techniques performed at the Main Operating Theatre SFGH was successfully televised live to an audience in the ICT Department's Conference Room at the Bachelors Medical Quarters, comprising SWRHA's surgeons and other medical officers from various health institutions in Trinidad and Tobago.



Haemodialysis Unit Observes **WORLD KIDNEY DAY**

he staff of the Haemodialysis Unit, San Fernando General Hospital observed World Kidney Day by hosting a health fair at the hospital's foyer on Wednesday 11th March, 2015. This year's theme "Kidney Health for all" placed emphasis on the importance of overall kidney health and the impact of kidney disease in relation to other chronic diseases such as diabetes and hypertension.

Visitors to the fair were exposed to valuable information about healthy eating and meal preparation for dialysis patients, the water treatment process for dialysis and the dialysis treatment options available to patients. The participating departments were: Haemodialysis Unit; Ward 16B Nephrology; Nutrition and Dietetics Department; Water Treatment; and Medical Social Work Department.

Attendees enjoyed snack samples from the Nutrition and Dietetics Department and over 150 persons were screened by Haemodialysis staff for weight, blood glucose and blood pressure.

TRAINING WORKSHOPS FOR **SCREENING AND DIAGNOSING AUTISM**

utism Spectrum Disorders (ASDs) are a group of complex brain development disorders that are present in the early stages of childhood. The prevalence of ASDs is growing globally. In 2014, the World Health Organisation estimated that children with ASDs make up one percent of the world's population. By April 2015, within the South-West Regional Health Authority, 20 percent of patients at the Child Guidance Clinic had been diagnosed with an ASD.

In light of this, the dedicated staff at the Human Resources, Training Unit in collaboration with the University of the West Indies, Paediatrics Department and the Rotary Club of Port of Spain West, facilitated training sessions geared toward equipping medical and healthcare professionals in assessment, testing and diagnostic procedures for children and adults with ASDs.

Medical doctors from SWRHA's Child Guidance Clinic. Community Paediatrics Clinics and other Regional Health Authorities were trained in the Screening Test for Autism in Toddlers (STAT) and Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule (ADOS) from Friday 17th to Sunday 19th April, 2015 at the San Fernando Teaching Hospital.

STAT is an interactive measure developed to screen for autism in children between two to three years and is used by primary care providers who work with young children. ADOS is a tool that aids in



the diagnosis of autism and was developed to achieve an objective assessment of children with suspected autism.

These workshops were conducted by Dr. Zachery Warren, Associate Professor of Paediatrics, Psychiatry and Special Education; Director, Autism Clinical Services at Vanderbilt Kennedy Center Treatment and Research Institute for Autism Spectrum Disorders (TRIAD) in Nashville, Tennessee.

"Delays in the early identification of Autism is one of the biggest challenges experienced by healthcare providers. We can place tools in the hands of well-trained providers who are already caring for these children, so they can better accomplish the goals they already have for these children. If these primary care providers get the right tools we can help families come to grips with these challenging issues," Dr. Warren said.

These workshops will facilitate the timely assessment of ASDs, introduce new services to care for autistic children and improve the standard of observation, evaluation and diagnosis of ASDs in the SWRHA.

INDIAN WALK HEALTH CENTRE LAUNCHES **NEW DIABETIC SERVICE**

roper foot care is very important for persons with diabetes since diabetics are more vulnerable to foot problems which can lead to numbness as a result of reduced blood supply to the feet. In keeping with SWRHA's goal of improving the quality of healthcare to our clients, the Indian Walk Health Centre launched its Integrated Diabetic and Foot Care Clinic on Friday 17th April, 2015. This Health Centre has one of the largest diabetic clinics in the South-West region, treating approximately 120 clients per Chronic Disease Clinic session. The staff at the facility launched this initiative to provide the diabetic patients with a holistic service that will change their lives through education, thereby enabling them to monitor, manage and prevent the development of further complications due to diabetes.

In his address at the launch, Dr. Dale Sookoo, Medical Director, Primary Health Care stated that diabetes is one of the foremost chronic diseases and without proper care it could lead to heart disease and other complications. Currently there are 135,000 persons in Trinidad and Tobago living with diabetes and the International Diabetes Federation estimates that by 2035 there

DHV Christom explained that several members expressed interest and appreciation for the trip, as they rarely travelled or got the opportunity to visit tourist attractions and landmarks in Trinidad and Tobago. She added that this outing and other social activities such as these, aim to impact the mental, social and physical health of senior citizens.

This is in keeping with the World Health Organisation's (WHO) definition of active ageing. Active ageing is the process of optimizing opportunities for health, social participation and security in order to enhance the quality of life for persons as they age. WHO suggests that active ageing allows persons to realize their potential for physical, social, and mental well-being throughout their lives and



will 592 million persons globally living with this disease. Dr. Sookoo further underscored the importance of this new service which will help diabetic clients understand the disease and the need for proper foot care.

Ms. Pearline Francis, District Health Visitor welcomed this new initiative and commended ENA Rayette Mascall-Khan, Diabetic Resource Clinician, for her role in spearheading this new clinic. Clients will be able to access this new service on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

The Ste. Madeleine Health Centre Senior Citizens Recreation Camp is an initiative that was founded by DHV Christom and the staff at the Ste. Madeleine Health Centre on Tuesday 10th June, 2014. The Camp's objective is to positively affect and improve the health of elderly persons in the Ste. Madeleine District. The idea for this group originated in January 2014, when staff noticed increased visits to the health centre by senior citizens living with chronic diseases.

On the second Friday of every month, meetings are held at the Ste. Madeleine Health Centre. Mental Health Officers, psychologists, Dietitians and other medical and nursing staff, discuss healthy eating, how to stay happy, exercise and managing chronic diseases, with the members of the Camp. DHV Christom surmised that these meetings have contributed to fewer visits to the Health Centre and have created a stronger bond among senior citizens in their community.

BREASTFEEDING SEMINAR at Lengua Health Centre



ccording to the World Health Organization (WHO) breast milk is the first natural food for babies, it contains antibodies and nutrients essential for protection against infection and chronic diseases as well as sensory and cognitive development. The WHO recommends exclusive breastfeeding for the first six months of an infant's life starting within the first hour of birth and continuing up

to age two and beyond, accompanied by complementary nutritious foods. The staff at the Lengua Health Centre hosted a breastfeeding Seminar titled "The Call of Nature" on Monday 25th May, 2015 to provide patients of the Maternity Clinics with the critical support at the community level to help them realize the benefits and techniques of breastfeeding.

Ms. Ameeda Hasmath, District Nurse, said that the seminar was the start of their breastfeeding support at the centre as a baby friendly room has been set up for the purpose of counselling and guiding mothers through the feeding and weaning processes.

In her address Mrs. Patricia Granger, Primary Care Nurse Manager, told the audience that breastfeeding is the natural way of feeding, it satisfies the instinctive urge of a newborn baby who turns its head towards his or her mother's breast to feed on this complete food that can ensure continuity of life and a healthy population.

Ms. Joanna John, Counsellor, Breastfeeding Association of Trinidad and Tobago, gave the feature presentation, a comprehensive overview which covered the advantages of breastfeeding, the proper feeding positions used and the physiology of lactation. While Ms. Cynelle Vincent, Dietitian, Nutrition and Dietetics Department, SWRHA, delivered her presentation on the nutritive component of breast milk compared to cow's milk and the importance of a proper diet for mothers during breastfeeding.

Sereus', was named after the microorganism Bacillus Cereus that causes food poisoning as a result of improperly prepared and stored food. Dr. B. Sereus' body composed of pipettes tips, test tubes and petri-dishes of various sizes stained with glue and colouring to portray microorganisms that are often found in the lab during testing.

The week of activities culminated with a closing ceremony at the Conference Room in the Bachelor Medical Quarters on Friday 24th April, 2015. In his opening address, Mr. Rudranath Benasrie, Laboratory Manager, addressing a crowd of approximately 35 Medical Lab Technicians and Medical Lab Assistants, said

that he was encouraged by the innovation, passion, teamwork and camaraderie shown among the laboratory staff. He further stated that this reflected "an active interest and the potential" of the staff at the Pathology Lab and encouraged them to maintain the enthusiasm displayed during the week.



MANAGEMENT OF AGGRESSION TRAINING

raining presentations on the Prevention and Management of Aggression and Violence were held on Friday 23rd January, 2015 at the Nurses Lounge. These two-day presentations organised by the Psychiatry Services aimed to increase staff knowledge and confidence in conflict resolution, improve responses to aggressive behaviour and increase staff self-protection skills.

Approximately 30 persons attended the first day of presentations which were done by Dr. Enal Maharaj, House Officer, Mrs. Joanna Maharaj, Psychiatric Social Worker II, and Mrs. Merene Singh, Mental Health Officer II. These officers completed training in Management of Aggression conducted by Dalhousie University of Nova Scotia, Canada, under the sponsorship of the Mental Health Unit in the Ministry of Health.



Doctors, Psychiatric Social Workers and Mental Health Officers comprised the first group of persons to receive training. The presentations examined the factors influencing crisis, defined conflict and its relation to anger, addressed survival intuitions and highlighted the importance of taking a collaborative approach towards conflict resolution.

n 2013, about 2.1 million adolescents between the ages of 10 and 19 were living with HIV worldwide. To prevent the spread of new infections, adolescents and young people need accurate and relevant information about HIV, along with a safe environment in which they can talk openly about risk behaviour (source: http:// data.unicef.org/hiv-aids/adolescents-young-people). The Caroni South Cluster provided one such environment during their inaugural HIV Quiz which took place on Wednesday 4th February, 2015 at the Couva District Health Facility. The focal point of this pre-carnival HIV awareness activity was to educate teens about the dangers of HIV and the preventative steps which can be taken to protect against contracting this and other sexually transmitted diseases during this season and beyond.

Dr. Dale Sookoo, Medical Director, Primary Health Care said that in 2013, the World Health Organization estimated that there were 14, 000 persons in Trinidad and Tobago living with HIV of the estimated 35.3 million persons globally. These statistics highlighted the need for persons to gain easy access to information on how to prevent the transmission, manage their health, gain HIV treatment and where they can go for counselling, support and care. Dr. Sookoo further encouraged the students to become the vehicles for change by sharing the knowledge gained with peers, family members and the community.

Students from the Miracle Ministries Pentecostal Secondary School placed first in the competition, while Preysal High School and Waterloo West High School placed second and third respectively. Participants in the guiz were Form 1 students from: Miracle Ministries Pentecostal Secondary School; Preysal High School; Carapichaima West Secondary School; Tabaquite Secondary School; Waterloo West High School; and Couva West Secondary School.

he Drug Treatment Court (DTC) of Trinidad and Tobago was established in San Fernando (September, 2012) and Tunapuna (July, 2014), under The Honourable Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Ivor Archie, in response to concerns about the number of persons before the Courts on drug related charges. This Court provides an opportunity to address in a more effective manner the disease of substance abuse among non violent offenders while reducing the recurrence of persons relapsing into a life of crime (Judiciary of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago).

The Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Centre (SAPTC) of the Psychiatric Department will be partnering with the Judiciary of Trinidad and Tobago to offer the professional mental health and wellness support required to rehabilitate the Court selected candidates. The SAPTC services will include:

- · Treating all offenders sent to the SAPTC
- Conducting the drug tests and certifying the report for the court
- · Offering individual and group counselling

Persons who accept responsibility for their addiction and agree to enter the court supervised treatment will also learn techniques of self examination which promote continued abstinence from drugs and alcohol for their seamless reintegration into society.



- 1 1/2 lb Sweet Potato grated
- 1 lb Pumpkin grated
- 1 Coconut grated
